

## **Sample Letter to Media and Schools**

### **MALARIA AWARENESS DAY 30<sup>TH</sup> APRIL**

Malaria is one of the World's deadliest diseases. Each day it claims at least 3,000 lives, mostly children under 5 years of age and pregnant women. This is the equivalent to the total lives lost in the September 11, 2001 terrorist attack on the World Trade Centre Twin Towers as a daily occurrence.

Perhaps half a billion people will contract malaria each year. Rotary and many other organisations including the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Global Fund are working together in the global "Roll Back Malaria" campaign.

The WHO has recognised 25<sup>th</sup> April as World Malaria Day. In Australia we have set aside 30<sup>th</sup> April as "Malaria Awareness Day" so as not to conflict with ANZAC Day on the 25<sup>th</sup> April.

Rotarians in Australia have been actively working for some years to reduce the incidence of malaria in Papua New Guinea (PNG), the Solomon Islands and to the extent feasible East Timor.

In the absence of any vaccine to prevent the occurrence of malaria it has been found that providing the local peoples the protection of insecticide-treated bed nets is one of the most effective means of reducing the incidence of malaria. The anti-malarial programs may also encompass spraying, education, provision of appropriate chemicals, eradication of breeding sites (when feasible), provision of equipment, infrastructure and transport facilities.

These anti-malaria activities have proven to be effective in saving lives and generally improving the health and well being of the local peoples. In the Western Solomon Islands for instance the Rotary initiated program in late 2001 has steadily reduced the rate of malaria from around 30% to the present 5% level and in some cases even lower.

It should be emphasised that Rotary is working closely with the WHO, AusAid, the relevant governmental agencies in PNG and the Solomon Islands and local Rotarians.

Rotarians and Rotary Clubs throughout Australia have been "Adopting" villages in PNG and the Solomon Islands which essentially means providing the moneys to afford all the people in a village the protection of insecticide-treated bed nets. As a guide \$1,000 will adopt a small village, \$2,000 a medium-sized village and \$3,000 a large village. All personal and corporate donations made to Rotary Australia Overseas Aid Fund (RAM) are tax deductible.

Hence the rationale for a Malaria Awareness Day is Australia on April 30<sup>th</sup> this year and subsequently each year thereafter.
