Project Overview

Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

The overarching goal of the project is to ensure full implementation of activities required to achieve malaria elimination in Vanuatu, in line with the National Strategic Plan for Malaria Elimination 2021-2026. This new ambitious strategy shifts the malaria elimination goal two years earlier than originally anticipated, based on ongoing successes in reducing malaria burden. In 2019, there were 579 malaria cases throughout the country, with transmission concentrated in three islands (of 83): Santo, Malekula and Epi. This project therefore seeks to focus efforts to mop up the remaining foci of transmission by supporting the application of indoor residual spraying to target and kill malaria-transmitting mosquitoes. This will include the procurement of equipment and supplies (insecticide, personal protective equipment) and conducting training of trainers for spray operations. This is a proven approach that has been used worldwide as well as previously in Vanuatu. The elimination of malaria in Vanuatu will be advantageous to the whole population of the country, not only through improved health and well-being but also through benefits to the economy and tourism.

Why did you choose to partner with this organization and what will its role be?

The VBDCP has demonstrated credibility in delivery of malaria services, as shown by the continued decline in malaria burden throughout Vanuatu with the annual parasite incidence dropping from 6.9 in 2016 to 1.9 in 2019. The VBDCP is supported from recurrent budget provided by the Government of Vanuatu and from development partners including the World Health Organization, the Australia Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, and the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria (and obtained an A2 grant performance rating from the latter for 2019).

Despite the strong emphasis and commitment to malaria elimination and ongoing achievements, the VBDCP continues to face some challenges in maintaining financial support due to continuous funding uncertainties from

the Government and other development partners. In 2020 there is an approximate 18% decline in the overall operational budget of the MOH 2020 Business Plan. This shift has resulted in a critical under-funding of activities from malaria elimination in 2021 onwards despite an increase in trained staffs. While resource mobilization efforts are ongoing, it is anticipated that there will be gaps in support for implementing key components of the National Malaria Strategic Plan 2021-2026.

Therefore, to achieve malaria control and elimination targets the VBDCP seeks financial support from Rotarians Against Malaria to ensure that universal access to prevention primarily with long-lasting insecticidal mosquito nets, indoor residual spraying and quality-assured diagnosis and treatment is achieved and maintained. This will be coupled with mobilizing local communities and their representative bodies to adopt healthy behaviors and retain a high level of awareness of the importance of malaria elimination to Vanuatu.

For this project, VBDCP will plan, implement, monitor, and evaluate activities funded by Rotarians Against Malaria & New Zealand Rotary District 9910. Quarterly progress report will be provided to Rotarians. If procurement of items is required, VBDCP will provide Rotarians with clear specifications for equipment and supplies plus proposed vendors for purchase in-country or internationally.

Project planning

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

Vanuatu faces an evolving triple burden of disease in the form of: increasing rates of NCDs; emerging threats from climate change, and death and illness from communicable diseases; and conditions affecting mothers and children. NCDs – in particular diseases of the circulatory system, diabetes, cancers and chronic respiratory disease – are among the most common causes of adult morbidity and premature mortality. In children, respiratory infections, diarrhoeal disease and neonatal conditions continue to account for most childhood illnesses and under-five deaths. Despite some progress in neonatal, infant and child health, the decline in under-five mortality and infant mortality appears to have plateaued over the past 10 years. Undernutrition and stunting remain a concern. Maternal and neonatal health continue to pose major challenges as access to emergency obstetric and neonatal services remains limited. The prevalence of communicable diseases such as tuberculosis (TB) and STIs remains high and the population is at risk from disease outbreaks such as dengue fever, measles and other vaccine-preventable diseases, and emerging regional and global infectious diseases threats that carry a risk of cross-border outbreaks, epidemics and pandemics.

Malaria has historically been one of the leading causes of ill health in Vanuatu. In 1990, this mosquito-borne disease infected an estimated 198 per 1,000 people and caused many deaths; as recently as 2010, it was among the top five notifiable diseases nationally. Despite the impressive decline in malaria in Vanuatu, while there is ongoing transmission there is still a risk for the entire population of malaria resurgence. This would place further burden on the already at-risk population, therefore malaria elimination is a necessary goal.

How did your project team identify these needs?

The National Strategic Plan for Malaria Elimination (2021-2026) lays the foundation for planning towards the 2023 target of nationwide malaria elimination. This Strategic Plan was formulated based on consultations with communities, provincial staff and national staff of the Ministry of Health. Identified as a key intervention in this plan is:

To maintain very high levels of coverage with long-lasting insecticidal mosquito nets (LLIN); and to rapidly reduce malaria transmission in selected higher-incidence areas and foci using indoor residual spraying (IRS).

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

Community members are continually engaged through Ministry of Health mechanisms via healthcare workers in peripheral health facilities such as aid posts, health centers and dispensaries. Further community engagement is conducted during awareness and bednet distribution campaigns. Feedback over numerous years indicates that that community members are very interested for indoor residual spraying to be recommenced in Vanuatu; many remember the benefits conferred by the spray campaigns conducted in the 1990s to reduce malaria burden, plus the additional side benefits of reducing other pests and vermin in households.

How were community members involved in planning the project?

Mapping of households was planned to be commenced in April 2020 but has been delayed to Q3/Q4 of 2020 due COVID-19. This exercise of mapping the households to be targeted for spraying will include a community engagement component to involve community leaders and decision-makers in the process of planning and implementation, including to identify community volunteers who may assist with the spray operations.

Briefly describe the other initiatives and how they relate to this project.

In the health sector, the VBDCP coordinates with other initiatives through the provincial malaria teams, who maintain contact with community leaders and community-based groups. Health sector initiatives include integrated community awareness activities such as for handwashing and hygiene awareness to reduce the risk of water-borne and respiratory diseases, as well as community clean-up campaigns to reduce dengue risk. There have been insufficient funds to support re-initiation of indoor residual spraying, despite this being continually requested by the community.

Please describe the training, community outreach, or educational programs this project will include.

The project will include training of trainers to be able to guide spray operations, especially training of the field-based spray operators.

How were these needs identified?

While there are numerous personnel with the Ministry of Health at national and provincial levels who have had experience with indoor residual spraying, there has not been IRS implemented in Vanuatu for some time. The equipment to be procured and insecticides to be used also deviate from the past, and therefore specific training will be required for appropriate use of these. Therefore, training of these key persons is required to be able to complete essential spray operator training. This has been confirmed during consultants with national and provincial teams.

Community members will be engaged as volunteers to assist with spray activities and will be paid a nominal rate consistent with the Ministry of Health scale for this function.

The VBDCP will continue to oversee the continuation of indoor residual spraying after the grant-funded activities conclude, in line with the National Strategic Plan for Malaria Elimination.

Local vendors will be used for purchase of the non-specialised supplies, including the personal protective equipment for spray operators. The Ministry of Health has procured these items previously therefore the same suppliers will be used to maintain consistency.

The spray machines will be housed at the National Bednet Storage Facility in Port Vila, and will be dispatched to the provinces during spray operations. The equipment will undergo maintenance annually as recommended by the manufacturer. Maintenance training will be provided remotely by the suppliers of the spray equipment (machines and attachment), with training modules currently under development. The spray machines and attachments will be used only by those who have undertaken training, as included in the project.

Describe how community members will maintain the equipment after grant-funded activities conclude. Will replacement parts be available?

The equipment will ultimately be maintained by the Malaria and Other Vector Borne Diseases Control Program, with responsibility conferred to Provincial Malaria Supervisors in key provinces where some machines may be stored for rapid access. Replacement parts will be purchased during the initial procurement,

and requirements will be re-assessed every year.

The equipment to be procured could be considered low-tech and easy to apply. The Ministry of Health do not anticipate that there will be any cultural sensitivities with regards to it's use. The addition of the spray quality attachment will be accompanied by training on its use and maintenance, and based on reports of usage from other countries during the piloting phase this could also be considered an easy-to-apply solution to an ongoing problem of quality assurance of spray operations.

A conflict of interest is defined as a situation in which a Rotarian, in relationship to an outside organization, is in a position to influence the spending of TRF grant funds, or influence decisions in ways that could lead directly or indirectly to financial gain for the Rotarian, a business colleague, or his or her family, or give improper advantage to others to the detriment of TRF.
